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Message from the Relieving Principal

This term is certainly moving at a fast pace with us almost at the halfway mark already. A lot has occurred during the past fortnight with more great events planned for the rest of the term. I look forward to sharing these with you over the coming weeks.

Excursions

At Harcourt, we are fortunate to have dedicated and committed staff who give of their time to plan and coordinate excursions and incursions for students. As you would be aware this is a complex task ensuring all details are gathered, the needs of all students are met, safety is ensured and changes to normal routine are developed and communicated to everyone involved. This term we have already seen a visit from Healthy Harold, safety instruction delivered by the NRMA team, a Year 6 excursion supported by the Campsie RSL and a trip to Sculptures by the Sea for Stage 2.

For these events to occur we often require permission or payment to be sent to the school by a nominated date. I would ask for your support in returning the permission for your child to attend by the nominated date as decisions and details need to be finalised. The last few events have seen students unable to attend due to late notification which is something I would like to reduce. If there is a concern with the details or financial hardship, please contact the office prior to the date and I will meet with you to see if we can assist you in any way.

Parking and student safety

Last Thursday I was met with a concerning practice that I would ask for community support to change. The excursion from Sculptures by the Sea returned at bell time. As the busses arrived a dangerous situation arose due to parents parking in the bus zone. Fortunately, many parents were still in the cars so I was able to request their movement at the time.

Parents and carers are reminded to follow the road and parking rules for the safety of students. Please don't double park while waiting for a parking space. Move up and around the road, looking for other spaces. Three-point turns are problematic especially when pulling into driveways and onto the footpath where students are walking. Parents and carers are also asked not to park across residential driveways as this inconveniences occupants. The Local Area Command often patrol the area and have also expressed concern around the safety issues we are experiencing. Intention to apply for Year 7 entry to a selective high school in 2018

Selective high schools cater for highly achieving academically gifted students who may otherwise be without classmates at their own academic and social level. These schools help gifted and talented students to learn by grouping them with other gifted and talented students, teaching them in specialised ways and providing educational materials at the appropriate level.


Applications for selective high school placement are considered mainly on the basis of the Selective High School Placement Test results and school assessment scores. The Selective High School Placement Test will be held on Thursday 9 March 2017.

If you would like to have your child considered for Year 7 selective high school entry in 2018, you need to do so soon. You will need to apply on the internet using a valid email address (not the student's email address).

Detailed instructions on how to apply online will be available from 11 October 2016 in a printed application information booklet and at www.schools.nsw.edu.au/shsplacement. The application website opens on 11 October 2016 and closes on 14 November 2016. No late applications will be accepted.

There are no paper application forms. If you do not have internet access, you could apply at a public library. If you have a disability that prevents you from using a computer, you can contact the Unit for assistance.






Using visuals is an important part of learning a second language.
